



2023 Practising Certificate Fee consultation

Introduction

Each year, CILEx Regulation (CRL) and the Chartered Institute of Legal Executives (CILEX) consult upon the proposed practising certificate fees to be charged to the regulated communities.

This consultation sets out the proposals for the 2023 practising certificate fee.

CILEX and CRL are required by to provide, as part of the consultation process, the following information:

- how we calculate the practising fee,
- the fee distribution between individuals and firms,
- how we intend to use your fee in 2023, linking this back to our strategic objectives and our day-to-day regulatory activities.
- a breakdown of the 2022 practising fee, to show how we have used the fee so far this year

This year, we have clearly delineated the share of the practising fee taken by CILEX and by CRL and set our work, both for the year to date and for 2023. By setting out the information in this way, we hope that you will be able to engage effectively with the consultation.

As usual, we have also included an equality and diversity questionnaire as part of the consultation response form, this has been extended this year to enable us to identify more completely any potential differential impacts of the 2023 practising fee on protected groups.



CILEx Regulation Limited Practising Certificate Fee Consultation 2023

Purpose:

1. The purpose of this consultation is to outline how we have used our share of your practising certificate fee in the first six months of 2022 and to set out our proposals for the 2023 practising certificate fee.

About us:

2. CILEx Regulation is the independent regulator for chartered legal executives, other grades of CILEX membership, CILEX Practitioners and firms, including ACCA-probate firms. We take a risk based and outcomes focused approach to regulation, by working constructively with our regulated community to ensure that they deliver the best outcomes for clients. We have set clear principles within our Code of Conduct and inform the public of the standards they can expect. We believe this provides a balanced approach. In 2021, we were assessed by the LSB as meeting all the outcomes within their regulatory assessment framework.

What is the practising certificate fee?

3. The practising certificate fee is the fee paid by qualified lawyers and regulated law firms (authorised persons) for the cost of regulation and related activities. The practising certificate fee funds the activities of CRL, some activities of CILEX (those that are permitted under the Legal Services Act) and the cost of the Legal Services Board and other bodies.

How is the practising fee calculated and apportioned between CILEX and CRL?

- 4. CRL creates its budget each July. Other income that CRL expects to receive (for example, from fees paid by individuals applying to be authorised and fees paid by practice rights holders and firms) is taken from that budget, which leaves the amount to be charged to Chartered Legal Executives and Associate Prosecutors.
- 5. CILEX calculates its budget for activities that it is allowed to undertake as the approved regulator (called permitted purposes) and an estimate of the levies to be paid to the Legal Services Board etc. is included in the final practising certificate fee budget.
- 6. The fee payable by each Chartered Legal Executive and Associate Prosecutor can then be calculated by dividing the anticipated number of each group into the total budget.
- 7. For 2022, CRL's share of the practising certificate fee was £222. Our proposal for 2023 is to **hold** our share of the fee **at £222**.


January to June 2022, CRL's activities at a glance:



8. In addition to our core regulatory activities, CRL has been working on a range of activities for the benefit of the regulated community, consumers and the public, including:

- a. Developing a new, streamlined, and cost-effective approach to authorising and regulating law firms, as part of a package of measures to make regulation simpler and cheaper for the benefit of both the consumer and our regulated community
- b. Working in partnership with the University of Law, to open the new route to practice rights. The first assessment opportunity should be available in quarter four of 2022.
- c. Creating a toolkit for advocates in the Coroners' Court in collaboration with the Solicitors' Regulation Authority and the Bar Standards Board
- d. Beginning the work to make an application to the Legal Services Board to open opportunities for CILEX members to gain Higher Rights of Audience
- e. Working with the Institute of Apprenticeships, CILEX and the Employer Group we have been progressing the development of a revised chartered legal executive apprenticeship standard that will incorporate the new education standards
- Holding conversations with insurers and brokers to tackle the PII market for CRL regulated firms
- g. Consulting on an approach to ensure that our existing regulated firms are able to continue to operate following the withdrawal of the insurer of our compensation arrangements
- h. In collaboration with the ICAEW (chartered accountants), we have had meetings with UK Finance to aid understanding of non-solicitor probate practitioners to start to address the barriers in dealing with high street banks
- i. Working with other frontline regulators, the Legal Services Board, OPBAS and the Ministry of Justice on a range of regulatory issues, including financial sanctions, anti-money laundering, digital identity, improving transparency for the consumer, and seeking to enable CILEX Advocates to become involved in delivering advocacy in domestic violence cases
- j. Continuing to work with the Home Buyers and Sellers Group and the Land Registry, and
- k. Hosting a cross-sector roundtable focused on equality, diversity and inclusion, with an emphasis on barriers to career progression in the legal sector. We have also joined the other frontline regulators to sign the LSB's statement on counter-inclusive practices.

2022 budget to actuals for 2022





9. Overall, CRL's budget against actuals for 2022 are performing as anticipated and CRL's operations are predicted to breakeven at the end of 2022.

- 10. Owing to a restructure, which took place after the 2022 budget had been set, there are some changes to staff time allocated to the unit costs of each activity. This has affected performance against individual budget lines. In addition, CRL has seen increases in VAT (loss of relief), increased national insurance charges and a reduction in shared services costs owing to CRL no longer using CILEX premises (which remain closed). There have also been fewer than budgeted entity applications and renewals (largely owing to issues with access to PII and compensation arrangements).
- 11. In addition to CRL's performance against its budget, CRL has utilised some of its operating reserves during 2022 to fund a number of projects including the review of entity regulation and the compensation arrangements changes. CRL's reserves remain within its reserves policy.

Our plans for 2023

- 12. CRL will continue to regulate all CILEX members in the public and consumer interest in 2023.
- 13. In addition to delivering our core regulatory activities to high standards, CRL will deliver year two of its strategic objectives:
 - a. We will uphold standards whilst pursuing innovative models to improve access and minimise the regulatory burden
 - b. We will enhance the information available to consumers to improve accessibility to legal services, and
 - c. We will champion fair access for all in the legal services market

CRL's budget for 2023

- 14. Our total budget for 2023 is £1,902,254. The total practising certificate fee budget for 2023 is £1,529,136, an increase of £70,597 (4.84%). The increase is explained as follows:
 - A return to in-person hearings
 - Increases in administration costs (changes to VAT relief, increased banking charges to accommodate card payments and staff training)
 - An increase in staff costs (reallocating finance and HR staff to the CRL budget from shared services, as the majority of these services will no longer be provided to CRL by CILEX, increased national insurance payments, and cost of living pay increases)
 - An increase to the in-year budget as the 2022 budget was partly funded from CRL reserves to mitigate the proposed practising fee increase in 2022

Distribution between individuals and firms of the PCF for CILEx Regulation

15. The distribution of the expected practising certificate fee income from individuals with additional rights, Chartered Legal Executives and Associate Prosecutors v firms is as follows:

How we use our budget

- 16. As a smaller regulator, with 23 FTE staff, 79% of the PCF income is spent on our day-to-day regulatory activities (comprising education, authorisation, supervision, enforcement, governance, services we share with CILEX (e.g., IT support) and general management activities (e.g., development of functionality for the CRM). The remaining 21% of the PCF income is spent on activities which flow from our strategic objectives.
- 17. Our budget for 2023 is partly funded by the practising certificate fee paid by chartered legal executives and partly funded by the fees paid by others we regulate (including CILEX Practitioners, CILEX firms and ACCA individuals and firms, as well as from application and accreditation fees we receive).
- 18. For 2023, our budget by activity breaks down as follows:

Who pays for CRL's regulatory activities?

19. Some of these activities cover regulatory activities for non-authorised CILEX members (notably supervision and enforcement), even though these are funded only by the authorised community such as chartered legal executives.

20. In 2023, CRL will seek to work with CILEX to create a fairer balance between the costs of regulation and those who pay for it.

The practising certificate for 2023

21. As part of its activities carried out as part of its share of the practising certificate fee, CILEX collects the fee and issues the practising certificate. For 2023, CILEX is proposing to issue a digital 'badge', rather than a traditional certificate, similar to those issued for its qualifications. As part of the consultation process, your views are sought on this proposal.



CILEX PCF consultation 2023

How CILEX has used its share of the 2022 practising fee between January and June 2022:

- 22. CILEX's share of the 2022 practising fee is £121, it can only be used to fund activities which are permitted under the Legal Services Act. CILEX uses these funds to provide the following services to chartered legal executives:
 - Membership/Sales & Development/Operations (including Education)
 - Policy and Governance
 - Communications
 - Central Resources and Admin


CILEX's budget for 2023

- 24. Our total budget for 2023 is £10,019,918. In addition to the PCF, CILEX receives income from other sources (e.g., the Law School, sale of assessments etc.).
- 25. Our total practising certificate fee budget for 2023 is £821,687, an increase of £38,267 (4.88%). The increase is explained as follows:
 - A slight increase to the policy and governance budget
 - A slight increase to the communications budget
 - A slight increase to the Membership/Sales & Development/Operations (including Education), and
 - A slight increase to the central resources and administration budget
